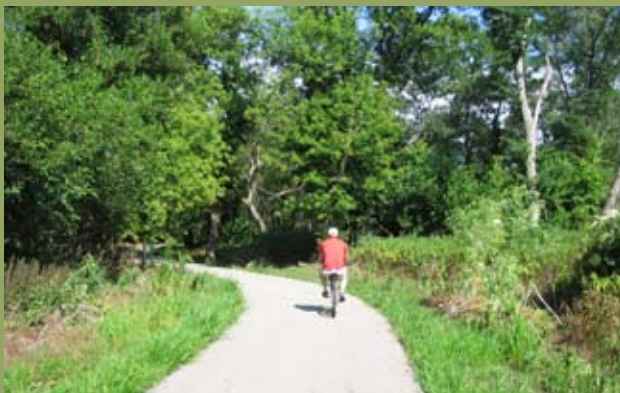


TRAIL USE

- Always wear a helmet.
- Be respectful of all trail users.
- Ride on the right.
- Pass on left, use voice, horn or bell to signal you are passing.
- Respect the land. Don't litter.
- Motorized vehicles are prohibited from using the trail.
- When stopping, step off the trail so others can pass safely.
- Observe all traffic signs—it's the law!



ABOUT THE T-BONE TRAIL

The T-Bone Trail takes its name from an event called Operation T-Bone Days originating in the town of Audubon. The Rock Island Railroad built a spur line from Atlantic to Audubon in 1878 to facilitate transportation of cattle to the stockyards in Chicago. The trail is built on the rail bed of that spur, which was abandoned in the 1990s.

- The trail is 21 miles long.
- The surface is asphalt/concrete.
- The trail is intended for biking, walking, and roller-blading.

BRAYTON

- Trailhead: Old Glory Park on US Hwy 71
- Parking
 - Picnic Area
 - Restrooms
 - Playground



I-80 & HWY 71*

- Trailhead: 0.7 miles south of I-80
- Motel
 - Picnic Shelter
 - Gas / Convenience Store
 - Parking

DUNBAR ROAD

- Trailhead: From Atlantic, 3 miles north on Olive (N16), and 1.5 miles east on Dunbar Road
- Small Parking Area



DISTANCES

- Audubon—Hamlin= 4 miles
- Hamlin—Exira=6 miles
- Exira—Brayton=4 miles
- Brayton—I-80/71=4 miles
- I-80/71—Dunbar Road=3 miles
- Dunbar Road—Atlantic= Approximately 4 miles, to be completed.
